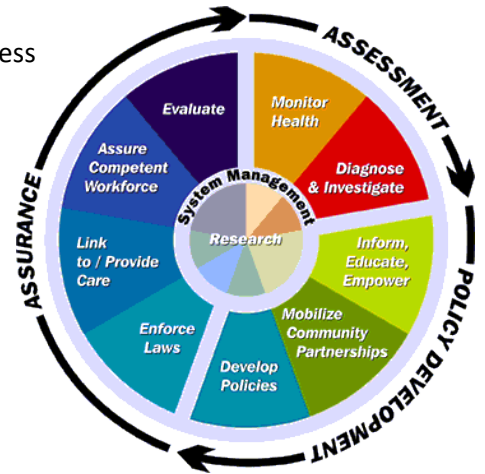

Radon

WCHD is working with the winner of the radon contest, whose radon level was found to be 3.9 pCi/L, a level at which it is strongly recommended to perform radon mitigation. A mitigation contractor was selected and is scheduled to perform work on August 15. WCHD will send out its radon specialist to conduct interviews and take video to be used in social media posts to increase radon awareness.

Vector Surveillance (West Nile Virus)

WCHD continues to operate mosquito traps and test mosquitoes for West Nile Virus. In July, one additional trap found positive mosquitoes, totaling four positive pools for the year. Additionally, WCHD continues to collect and test dead birds for WNV. To date, no birds have tested positive in Winnebago County. There appears to be a trend of fewer birds testing positive each year. Program staff will be discussing this finding with IDPH at the upcoming conference.

The Illinois Youth Survey (IYS)



The Substance Use Prevention Specialist (SUPS) and HP Supervisor met with South Beloit CUSD 320, Hononegah School District 207, and Rockford Catholic Diocese to discuss IYS survey tool benefits, how results can be used for prevention program planning and community wide prevention efforts,

and how to register to participate in 2020 IYS survey. All were receptive to participating in the survey for 2020 and working with the SUPS to help with review and program planning. More districts will be scheduled for August and September 2019 to review IYS benefits and encourage participation for 2020.

- **Domain 2 – Diagnose and Investigate**

- Creating a Lead Safe Rockford (CLSR) 2016 Objectives

CLSR program staff continue to work on the 2019 application for continuing its lead grant from HUD. Program staff, working with finance staff, have developed a program budget. Staff have also reached out to Stephenson and Boone County Health Departments to include them as partners and discuss potential roles and responsibilities in the proposed grant program. The current grant program is still concerned over the slowdown caused by delays and findings from the state historic preservation agency. Environmental Health Director continues to reach out to the historic preservation agency for clarification, and will reach out to IDPH for assistance if these questions have not been addressed.

Communicable Disease Activities

Shiga toxin-producing E. coli O015:H7 Outbreak (STEC):

The Communicable Disease (CD) and Environmental Health Improvement (EHI) Teams completed their public health investigation of the outbreak. Requested environmental controls and procedures have been completed and are in compliance.

- Collected food specimens collected were negative for STEC.
- Log sheets for tracking temperature of coolers, freezers, end cooking temperatures, hot holding temperatures and foods during the cooling process were implemented and did not identify any temperature excursions.
- Written procedures for handwashing, food storage, pizza preparation/cooking, and meat and sausage grinding were developed and implemented.

The food handling staff completed the required testing and all were negative for STEC. Based on this information, the restaurant was able to return to full operations effective July 23, 2019, including sausage preparation.

Ebola: Awareness and Action

The Communicable Disease Team issued a Health Alert regarding the Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC) issued by the World Health Organization regarding the Ebola outbreak in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and the actions steps healthcare providers should take if they suspect a case. While there are no cases of Ebola in Winnebago County or in the United States at this time, and the risk of global spread remains low, healthcare providers should review procedures and precautions to take if they suspect a case. The Alert provided potential exposures and transmission of the disease including symptoms and recommendations for health care providers.

- **Domain 3 – Inform, Educate, and Empower**

“Protecting Your Sexual Health” Presentations in the Community

The Communicable Disease (CD) Team delivered its new sexual health presentation to local agencies/educational institutions to provide education on sexually transmitted infections (STI). The presentation includes the signs/symptoms of an STI, the importance of seeking treatment and ways

to prevent getting an infection. In addition, participants learned about the Ryan White Program for persons living with HIV and the services available to them. Each participant received an informational pamphlet on STI facts to take with them for reference in the future.

The presentations occurred on:

- July 16, 2019 – Robin Long and Tracy Box provided a presentation to 53 adolescents (ages ranging 15-18 years) at Rosecrance Griffin Williamson Campus, a substance abuse treatment facility.
- July 18, 2019 – Gerrica Sallis-Smith provided a presentation to seven adolescents (ages ranging 14-16) at the Hip Hop Therapy Workshop Summer Program at Rockford University.

Neighborhood Property Standards Update

WCHD is awaiting legal authority to proceed with demolition of the properties that are going through the “fast-track” process. Once this authority has been granted, program staff will begin working on the necessary environmental assessments (gas, electric, water, wastewater, asbestos). Following that, WCHD will solicit bids through the County Purchasing Department.

Tobacco Free Communities

Quitline Referral Partners:

The Health Promotion Supervisor met with the Winnebago County Housing Authority (WCHA) to discuss the process of becoming a referral partner for ITQL. WCHA has agreed to become a referral partner. The Housing Authority staff will be trained by ITQL staff in motivational interviewing and the referral process to get interested individuals signed up for smoking cessation assistance. As the WCHA continues to enforce smoke free campus policy, the ITQL will be an option for tenants to find assistance in helping to become tobacco free. Training will take place in August. No other referrals were provided in July.

Underage Drinking Parent Awareness:

The state required annual report and FY20 marketing plan have been submitted for approval by the University of Illinois Center for Prevention Research and Development (CPRD) staff, who are the designated evaluators for DHS Communication Campaign implementation. SUPS met with Harlem Middle School Principal to review past year activities and determine schedule and marketing

plan for upcoming school year 2019-2020. DHS is requiring SUPS staff to continue with the same school locations to maintain fidelity to outcomes from increased awareness among Harlem Middle School parents.



Chairman and Mayor's Youth Leadership Council

SUPS have been actively planning for YLC applicants, and restructuring of YLC meetings for 2019-2020. Youth organizations have been contacted to provide information and applications to youth members for the upcoming YLC year. The Mayor and Chairman have approved the new format with YLC utilizing the EYPC (Engaging Youth for Positive Change) developed by University of Illinois CPRD. SUPS are promoting membership applications and preparing for orientations and the start of the process for EYPC.

Trauma Informed Community

The Collective Impact Workgroup is developing a Trainer Agreement for Trauma 101 Trainers.

The Film Series Workgroup showed "Paper Tigers" at Harlem High School in July. Brock Morlan moderated and Lisa Clark participated in the discussion after the film with about 30 attendees. The next film will be "Resilience" in August. The Film Series workgroup will be merging with Public Awareness.

Dr. Martell and Brock Morlan met with the Winnebago County Sheriff to discuss participation in *Handle With Care*. The Sheriff is committed to having their trainers be trained in Trauma 101. An officer was trained and will shadow the next training being done by Mary Ellen and Lori. There is concern with information sharing at RPS and they are planning to make contact with Dr. Monson and Dr. Dettmar. The Erickson Institute partnership might present some opportunity. YSN will have 6.5 Trauma Therapists assigned to the RPS.

Judicial Practices – Trauma-informed yoga is being offered at the Winnebago County Jail.

The Public Awareness Workgroup has submitted an RFP for video production and television commercials. Modifications have been made to the brochure and the website and Facebook pages are being updated.

Training is scheduled on August 6 for the Retired Men of the YMCA and at the end of August for Rockford Public Library. Four additional people were trained to present the curriculum with more “train the trainer” sessions being planned.

The Healthcare Provider workgroup has met with the incoming Dean of Students for curriculum integration.

George Davis shared a link for a webinar regarding *historical transgenerational trauma*. It deals with both historical and event-based trauma, moving beyond individual to historical/population. George will reach out to the Steering Committee of Eliminate Racism as they have some subgroups that could participate and they established relationships.

Community Health Assessment (CHA)/IPLAN2023

Regular meetings of the IPLAN2023 Partner Steering Committee continue. During the July and August meetings, vision statements from the member organizations were shared and draft vision statements were developed for the CHA initiative.

The MAPP framework (Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships) is being used to guide the overall process. This process supports a regional approach in data collection, analysis and prioritization.

Working groups focusing on each of the key assessments (Community Health Status, Forces of Change, Local Public Health Assessment and Community Themes & Strengths) are being identified and meeting to ensure timely completion of elements.

Community Health Status Assessment – WCHD is working closely with University of Illinois College of Medicine at Rockford HPSSR to identify key metrics to measure current status of health in Winnebago and Boone Counties.

Forces of Change Assessment – WCHD, Transform Rockford, R1 Regional Planning and Winnebago County representatives are meeting to develop an integrated approach to engage key stakeholder and community groups.

Community Themes and Strengths Assessment – WCHD and Rockford Regional Health Council are developing an aligned approach to complete the community-wide survey.

Winnebago County Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition (WCSAPC)

The coalition has not met this quarter.

DOPP (Drug Overdose Prevention Program) Community Partnerships



- The DOPP Partnership continues to meet monthly to discuss training updates, review current data on overdose calls and area “hot spots”, and discuss outreach opportunities and strategies.
- Highlighted trainings: Rockford Rescue Mission, Rockford Township, Rockford Mayor’s Office, Mercy Residents and Rockton Fire.
- SwedishAmerican, Rockford Fire Department and the DOPP Specialist continue to train SwedishAmerican staff members, reaching nine clinics in July.
- The DOPP Specialist continues to work with SwedishAmerican on policy development, data collection and training of staff.
- SwedishAmerican has approved their policy to begin training overdose survivors and their family/friends in the emergency department.
- The Winnebago County Sheriff and Jail Superintendent met with the DOPP Specialist, Rockford Fire Department and SwedishAmerican to discuss ways to bring Narcan training to Winnebago County Jail inmates and correctional officers. The group plans to meet regularly and hopes to begin implementing trainings in the coming months.
- Two overdose reversal forms were received during the month of July.
- 181 community members received training in July.

SUPS are planning for new outreach to organizations and methods to reach specific populations with five months of information on prescription drug misuse, storage, and disposal. The awareness program will begin in February 2020 and end in June 2020.

- **Domain 5 – Policies and Plans**
Strategic Initiatives

The Policy Makers have drafted a policy on Mental Health, designed for internal use at WHCD. They have also drafted a Trauma Informed Policy to be implemented at WHCD to guide work with clients and the community. This policy could also serve as a sample for other organizations interested in becoming a trauma-informed workplace. These policies as well as the “healthy homes” policy are with the Reporters for review and revision.

The Assessors are working on collecting data about prenatal care in Winnebago County.

The Assurance workgroup is finalizing the work group outreach chart and has reviewed grants and looked over goals and objectives.

The Collaborators are working on obtaining contacts to deliver trauma proclamation packets.

The Organizers are developing an informative video featuring about the MAPP Assessment for the WCHD webpage and waiting room monitors to encourage public participation in the Community

Themes and Strengths survey. They are also developing a commercial for each Center to promote the services they provide by Public Health Week (April 2020).

The Reporters are developing a method to disseminate key messages on each health priority via the website. They are also identifying target audiences for a social marketing campaign to impact the maternal and child health priority.

The Workforce Development group presented “Strength Finders” to all supervisors.

Women, Infants, and Children Supplemental Nutrition Program (WIC)

- July was the beginning of WIC FY20 and a new caseload is 6848 (FY19 was 6613).
- WIC caseload for July was 6379, 93% of caseload. With continued phone outreach efforts, the WIC team added an additional 162 active participants this month compared to June, which helped to exceed new caseload goals.
- May and June breastfeeding exclusivity rates at 12 weeks were the highest seen during FY19. May was 13.6% and June was 12.0%.
- Katie and Taylor had meaningful breastfeeding contacts with 96 of 127 (76%) pregnant WIC mothers due within 30 days.
- WIC's new outreach collaboration with SwedishAmerican began this month. This outreach allows WIC staff to visit patients in the mother/baby unit before discharge with the hopes of increasing both breastfeeding exclusivity rates and WIC caseload. Since beginning this new SwedishAmerican outreach on 7/23, Katie and Taylor completed initial breastfeeding conversations and scheduled WIC appointments for 14 active WIC participants and added eight new WIC families to the caseload. Both WIC and SwedishAmerican staff have been excited and pleased with these initial outcomes.
- This month also began WIC's new Trauma Informed Community Initiative. The initiative provides WIC staff the ability to engage WIC participants in personal adverse experiences and provide a means to nurture resiliency by providing referrals made to support services. WIC nutritionists are assessing participants during transfer, certification and mid-certification appointments by asking "Have you or your family experienced any life changing events in the last six months? What support/referral services can we help you find today?" Since beginning this initiative on 7/18/19, 68 referrals were made to social services including food pantries, IGrow, housing, IDHS, mental health counseling, energy assistance, lead screening, Literacy Council, smoking cessation, job training and daycares. In addition, 54 immunization referrals were made during the month.

- The WIC supervisor attended the Region 2 WIC Coordinators meeting on 7/26/19. Topics discussed included vaping/marijuana use during pregnancy, FY20 Nutrition Education Plan caseload and breastfeeding activities.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention Grant

This Spring, the Winnebago County Health Department collaborated with the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to develop a grant proposal regarding Teen Pregnancy Prevention. IDHS received the grant in July and WCHD will be a sub-grantee. Working with the Children's Home and Aid, K-Fact, Rockford Public Schools, YMCA, and Youth Services Network, WCHD will provide age-appropriate, evidence-based risk reduction curriculum in Winnebago County. Details regarding funding and implementation of the 2-year grant will be provided as they are available.

- **Domain 11 – Administration and Management**

July was a busy month with the end of FY2019 grants, the beginning of the new fiscal year for the State of Illinois, and the development of the FY2020 Winnebago County budget.

On July 15, Dr. Martell and members of the Northern Illinois Public Health Consortium met with the Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health to discuss public health priorities for the region.

- **Domain 12 – Governance**

Standing meetings with Mayor McNamara and Chairman Haney were cancelled this month due to scheduling conflicts but regular communication on public health issues were shared throughout the month. Correspondence from a law firm representing the Winnebago Landfill was received on July 31, 2019 challenging the legality of the proposed amendments to the Waste Hauler Ordinance

which was to be considered by the Winnebago County Board. The Ordinance was removed from the Operations Committee of Winnebago County agenda pending review by the Winnebago County States Attorney.

Dr. Martell was appointed by Governor Pritzker to serve on the Health Facilities and Services Review Board for the state of Illinois on July 19, 2019.
